

Stupid Property rights - Part 2

Last month we looked at how internet file-sharing had impacted on the media industry and the idea of intellectual property. In this article we will focus on the legislative attempts to stem this flow of information which is sending fear through those in government, and those whom they serve — big business.

The general line of governments has been to narrow their criticism of the internet to it being a playground for paedophiles and a place to proliferate the spread of terrorism. More and more though, they are feeling the pressure from the media industry who are clamouring for more laws against the downloading of copyrighted materials. Most of the media's efforts in bringing the evil sharers to justice involve associations like the Motion Picture Association of America (MPAA) and the Recording Industry Association of America (RIAA). These two organisations constantly hit the headlines (well, if you're a geek) with a torrent (no pun intended)

of lawsuits against people who host or run file-sharing sites, as well as individuals.

Though you might dismiss their role in the copyright battle as being only of relevance to those in the US take a typically American stance of trying to police the world in these matters. They represent, and are comprised of, the biggest of the media corporations in the world and therefore are in a position to exert force onto governments, public institutions and other private companies pretty much as they see fit. Pressure on the Swedish government forced them to take action and close The Pirate Bay, one of the largest torrent-based file-sharing websites who have their servers located in Sweden - though they reopened days later as the MPAA was found not to have any legal standing.

Governments around the world are now busy writing legislation which, at least in the first instance, will force Internet Service Providers (ISPs) to block file sharing applications and monitor traffic for p2p usage. The British government, who since Mr Blair's inception have been firmly in the pocket of big business, are planning to legislate requirements of internet providers to take action with a '3 strikes' approach whereby if a user persists in downloading illegal content they would have their internet contract terminated. Virgin Media are the first ISP who are conducting a 3-strikes trial. This approach consists of smaller measures but which will affect a wider range of people. This is in contrast to the attitude of the American copyright lobbys who seek to make an example of everyone they try to prosecute - in as big a way as possible.

Many file-sharing sites have been forced to close up the free-shop in their home countries and move their servers to more lenient countries like Sweden(!) and China (!!!) Other data safe-havens have also included the Principality of Sealand Continued on the inside pages...

Legislation update

You can worry as much as you like about the police force being granted powers above all others in society — but at least they also have a habit of protecting you, at times when you really need it. More concerning is the encouragement of a Pig attitude in jobs where we have absolutely nothing to gain from their existence. To this end, new powers are to be granted to two jobs which are universally hated: parking wardens and bailiffs.

From 31 March there will be 10 levels of penalty for parking offences, depending on the actual offence, and where it is committed. Wardens will even be able to issue a ticket even if a car speeds off before they slap it on the windscreen; though they have been employing much sneakier 'no mercy' tactics for years, ever since many wardens began working on commission. The new act will see the top band of fines rise from £100 to £120 in London – and £60 to £70 elsewhere. The AA reckons about 75% of offences could

fall into the top bracket. Private clampers, car pounds run by private companies such as NCP, together with local authorities looking to make some easy money are a new form of mafia. There are few regulations to stop penalties being dished out willy-nilly, some of which total more than the worth of a cheap car.

There is some redressing of the balance including: adjudicators being given more powers to cancel fines in mitigating circumstances; increased discount period for fines sent by post – 21 days instead of 14; higher penalties for more serious offences, but smaller fines for less serious ones; quicker clamping and removal times for persistent evaders, but wheel clamping will generally be discouraged.

In all honesty though, you can only extend so much sympathy to people who insist on driving their cars around the city and parking them where they like. Something which can, and will, affect people on a far more serious level is the Tribunals, Courts and Enforcement Bill. This legislation is set to grant bailiffs in the UK the powers to legally break into homes in order to repossess possessions to pay for any outstanding debt. Under

the Bill, bailiffs would even be allowed to restrain people. It's worth considering that even before the Bill, a Citizen's Advice Bureau investigation claimed that two-thirds of bailiffs were guilty of harassment, intimidation and misleading people about their powers of entry.

Existing bailiff powers were set out in a complex series of archaic laws - some dating back to 1267. Under the terms of the new Bill, bailiffs will have the right to apply to court to use reasonable force to enter premises and debtors will no longer be able to refuse them entry. Although plans for independent regulation formed part of the original Bill, these have been dropped in favour of consultation on the issue, which will not be completed before the Bill becomes law, which looks certain. With credit fever leaving millions of Brits in spiralling debt this spells trouble with a capital T for many unable to keep up their payments. There are no criminal records checks for those who want to become bailiffs, highlighting the ludicrous nature of this Bill, which is designed to give authority to those who were previously just Police Without Powers.

MUSIC REVIEWS

FROGS #8 [Frogs Records]

Boosting up the Frogs repertoire comes this, one of the strongest releases from the label reknowned for its winning sense of humour. Amercian spaz-core artist Eustachian slips into some rudebwoy slippers for a jungle breakcore assault that will rock your nan's stack better than her usual crack. Pisshead northerner Teknoist also delivers the spilt pint goods with his blend of UK hardcore drum edits coupled with softer elements.

GHISLAIN POIRIER - No Ground Under [Ninja Tune]

I haven't kept up with any Ninja Tune

releases for about a decade (I used to smoke a lot more) but of late they've pulled in The Bug and now Ghislain Poirier to go all 'urban' on your behind. I think I mean that in a good way, but it has to be said that Ghislain's other releases have got a whole load more grit than many of the dancehall/booty bangers on here.

VARIOUS PRODUCTION – Diver EP [Various Production]

You could play a bunch of VP tracks and be convinced they were the work of many artists, which isn't the only impressive feature of the duo's accomplishments as many of their tracks are super-bad breakbeat phattys which will give your rig a workover. Special mention must go out to the track 'Monster' on this slab, coz it's fucking top banana.

(the famous oil-rig in the North Sea which was taken over and declared an independent state).

On a different note, there is a rising trend of people using the bittorrent method of distribution to distribute their own material, whether copyrighted or not. It's this idea of adapting the technology to suit your own needs which, perhaps thankfully, is currently eluding the corporations. That said, the BBC and other broadcasters are leading an EU-backed development team who are researching a next-level bittorrent opensource software application which will support streaming; presumably for them to stream TV programmes over, when the project surfaces with the right results.

The manufacturers of the digital technology who fostered this information age are now struggling to control the beast they created. How can we do our bit to loosen the reigns? Here are a few suggestions:

Setting up your own bittorent

tracker. Trackers are the sites which host the torrent file you need to download. Trackers don't actually store the actual content being shared, just the torrent file which tells you to connect to the tracker, which then tells you who all the other people who are sharing the file are. You then download the file in bits, direct from these other users. Though you'd need some pretty hefty servers to be one of the main tracker sites you can still set one very simply and use the same technology. www.xbtit.com / www.diferior.com

Become part of the Freenet project.

This project has been running for a few years now with the aim of building a decentralised network where data and users remain totally anonymous at all

times. Unfortunately it isn't presented in a user-friendly way and this has hampered the success and growth of the project. It's worth bearing it in mind if you need utmost privacy when planning your actions, or if you live in a totalitarian autocratic state big on censorship – hey, that'll be all of us soon enough!

Become a node on a wireless meshnetwork. Typical wi-fi networks involve beaming a signal around a building or a line-of-sight one-to-one connection over longer distances. Mesh-networking involves setting up basic servers which broadcasts to anyone in range; imagine it as a load of lilypads with a server at their centre. Each lilypad would ideally overlap and so create a working network. Mesh networks are used to wire up whole villages, districts or complexes with the internet at low cost. The meshing software keeps the whole thing running smoothly and it allows the possibility for other uses like file-sharing, p2p radio streams, community bulletin boards etc. www.locustworld.com

More significantly, the biggest step everyone can take is to drop the old-hat notions of intellectual property and realise it's a stage in our evolution that we are going through. We live in a world run in the most part by mad people who plead sanity whilst becoming increasingly obsessed with patenting natural plants and genetic structures, copyrighting anything from a stream of numbers to single words and common phrases – all whilst suing the pants of everyone who infringes upon their lunatic concepts.

For protection against commercial enterprises which might try to gain from your product, against your wishes, there are other forms of legal protection

like Copyleft declarations and Creative Commons Licences; both of which are in widespread usage.

Governments and corporations, despite their legislative and financial clout, will always be playing catch up to the masses in the digital age. The more we rely on and utilise technology, the more fallible in many respects it all becomes. Though it seems like it makes them stronger it can also render their foundations much weaker.
